



Discovering a new place to ride. Travel to the unknown and discover beautiful trails

Tumbler Ridge BC and area .

We started planning for this trip almost a year in advance. Tumbler Ridge is located about 2-1/2 hours west of Grande Prairie so it's a fairly long drive from Calgary. A little background information about Tumbler Ridge:

"Tumbler Ridge is a relatively small area, the hills, mountains and valleys around the town contain a remarkable variety of geological features and is known as an outdoors person's paradise. Founded in the early 80's as a mining community Tumbler Ridge has developed into a world class destination for eco-tourism. Featuring a full season's worth of hiking trails and many other recreational options Tumbler Ridge offers a unique experience. There is a magnificent diversity of outstanding and accessible mountain geology, extraordinary waterfalls, and dinosaur fossils and trackways unmatched in the known world. The area is also recognized internationally by UNESCO as a Global Geopark. Outdoor recreation goes way beyond hiking and exploring. They have active ATV and snowmobile clubs that have developed the back country for quadding, sledding and use by side by sides. The Murray River is also an amazing place to take a jet boat and they have campsites and lakes to satisfy any visitor whether they want to kayak, camp or just enjoy the peaceful serenity of the wilderness."

There are literally hundreds of kilometers of marked trails in the area and we had information for about 24 of them. Our original plans included about 10 people, mostly all from the Calgary area. To help keep the costs down we were planning to haul the ATVs up on one or two flat deck trailers and the rest of the group would travel up in a SUV. For accommodation, we planned on staying in a hotel or a VRBO in the town of Tumbler Ridge and then drive out to the staging areas each day. Most trails are within an hour's drive of the town center so staying right in Tumbler Ridge had lots of advantages and amenities as it's a town of nearly 2000

Day1: For the first day we opted for easier trails but still knocked off plenty of Km's. We started off riding a moderately easy trail that goes up along the mountain ridge overlooking the town of TR and then continued to Quality Lake, then on to Bear Hole Lake and then up to the fire lookout on Thunder Mountain which is the highest point in that area. After that, we took a bit of a back track and then we did a side trail to Mountain Goat Canyon where we actually got to see some mountain goats resting on a ridge. All in all, it was a very scenic and easy trail that consisted mostly of old logging, exploration and mining roads and trails. To finish the day off, we took the vehicles down to Kinuseo Falls. They are quite spectacular and one of the real gems in the area. They are a 70m cascading




Day 2: Adventures took us to Red Deer Falls and then on to Warner Lake which is below Mounts Knutsen and Pearson. It is a spectacular trail with amazing scenery and cliffs. It is rated moderately difficult, but it is very easy to the falls. The trail from Red Deer Falls to Warner Lake is an awesome high alpine trail that is a bit over grown in places. It includes a couple of legal river crossings that can be impassable depending on the water level. It also had a couple of mud holes and some rock crawls, but nothing that we found too difficult.



Day 3: We rode the Bull Moose and epic Mount Spieker trail which is a one-of-a-kind trail that runs up along a mountain ridge above the tree line. This is rated as one of the top 10 ATV trails in all of Canada for its beauty; and some would say it's actually the best. We were just shy of 2000m at the summit. The weather could have been better, but it was still an amazing day and ride. After that we also did some good old adventure riding down a pipeline and found a couple of really good and fun trails in the Bull moose area. All in all, a fantastic ride and day.



Day 4: Our last riding day in the area, and it was a toss-up between two trails, Core Lodge/5 Cabin creek/Mt Roman or Onion Lake trail. Teresa and Margaret opted for a break, so Malcolm and I decided to do the Onion Lake trail. It's one of the premier trails in the Tumbler Ridge area that TRMORE has rated 5 out of 5 for difficulty and it did not disappoint. It's an in and out trail that's only a 54km round trip, but they recommend that you allow 10 to 12 hours to complete it. After we completed it, both Malcolm and I agreed that it was one of the nicest but hardest trails that we have ever been on! Luckily it was a perfect day and we had great conditions. The trail is extremely technical including about 5 mountain peaks, steep rocky climbs, roots and stumps, boulders, muskeg, and extreme off cambers. It's best done in small groups. If a machine breaks down back in there chances are that the only way that you're going to get it back out is by helicopter, so plan accordingly. This trail is not for the faint of heart, but if you are an experienced rider and like to challenge your abilities, this trail is a must. *An interesting side note about Onion Lake is that it drains via an under-lake outlet.*

Every ride and group has a leader and at least one tail-gunner that enhance safety; volunteers do advance scouting and clearing of the proposed trails, arrange for and transport food, coffee and hot chocolate to events, collect fees, manage the website, arrange for safety courses,

attend and defend the Club's interests at various meetings, make trail improvements, and so on.

Thank you to everyone who have made the past years successful and filled with adventure. The Calgary ATV Riders could not have done it without the members and their support.

Keep your Radiator Clean!

We just can't tell you enough how important it really is!

When was the last time you were on the trails out for a long enjoyable ride with friends and theirs that one person in the group whose ATV overheats? This is something we find happens far too often while on club rides. The group will stop somewhere and clean their radiators to ensure a smooth, uneventful ride back yet there is always that one guy or gal who does not think it is necessary. Not 10 minutes down the trail with absolutely not a water source in site they overheat. After waiting for 20 minutes for them to cool down you go another 10 minutes and they overheat again and every 10 minutes for the next hour or two until you get back to the vehicles. It would have been easier for them to take those few minutes while everyone else was cleaning their radiator and give it a couple of squirts. It seems lately while on a club ride we are stopping regularly to wait for an ATV or UTV that has overheated. While we wonder what the problem could be, one look and it is confirmed, the radiator is packed with mud. The first question that comes to mind is "When was the last time you cleaned your rad?" Some of the most memorable answers have been, "Never", "I didn't know I had to clean the rad", "What, it's not that bad" or my favorite, "Why should I clean my rad, it's never over-heated before?" Sometimes you just have to shake your head and wonder if they know the damage that could happen to their

bike. Never mind holding up the group while they stop every few kilo-meters to cool their ATV down until they can reach a water source somewhere along the trail to clean their rad: which by the way is only a temporary solution. Now most of us would avoid the mud puddles for the rest of the day to prevent another overheating occurrence but not this person, they continue to play as much as they can in the mud and they overheat on a continual basis. Does this sound like someone you know or maybe you are that person?

Cleaning your rad after and during every ride is an essential part of regular maintenance. Not only do you want to clean the front of your rad but you want to make sure the backside is clean as well. You should be able to shine a light from the back of your radiator and see the light through to the front from corner to corner, not just in the center. There may be times when the radiator must be removed and soaked to completely remove the fine dust that accumulates and creates a concrete barrier. This is usually only necessary if you are a regular mudder.

There are many problems that can arise from continual or excessive overheating your ATV are, but not limited to: loss of antifreeze, base gasket leaking oil, piston and or rings melting, damaged water pump, blown head gaskets and in extreme cases irreparable dam-

age to your engine and your friends never asking you to come riding with them again. The best advice I can give is clean your radiator front and back using a low pressure hose after each ride ensuring the water runs clean. Carry a "Radblaster", pump or something you can use to clean your radiator with when you are close to water a water source. Radblaster's are a great item to have on your ATV or UTV. They can be used in the shallowest puddle of water and the pressure they produce is equal to the force you use. Check you radiator often and if others are cleaning their radiator it might be a good idea to clean yours as well. If you like to play in the mud clean it often or have it relocated. Most important is to never drive your ATV if it is overheating. Stop until it cools down and if possible clean you radiator. Reminder: be respectful when cleaning your radiator. Never drive your ATV or UTV up and down creeks or riverbeds..

- COHV all-terrain vehicle brands: Arctic Cat, BRP (Can Am), Honda, Kawasaki, KTM, Polaris, Suzuki, and Yamaha
- COHV Model Year January 1st – December 31st.

In 2019, sales of new all-terrain vehicles were approximately five hundred and nineteen million dollars at retail based on industry estimates.




